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FOUNDATIONS FOR FREEDOM

A Foundations for Freedom Regional Meeting in Krakow, Poland, over New Year brought together 40 young people from Central and Eastern Europe – and a few from other countries – for fellowship, commitment-strengthening, and looking ahead. They came from Lithuania, Belarus, Ukraine, Russia, Croatia, Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Poland, Germany, Holland, Britain, Kenya and Jamaica. Nearly all had taken part in FFF courses in their own countries or in Britain.

The first *FFF* 'Visiting Course' of 1996 is currently taking place in Estonia at the initiative of a student who took part in the 1994 International Course.

We would be very grateful for prayers for the funding for our continuing programme in 1996. Our budget is £80,000 of which the first £5,000 is needed immediately.

COMMUNICATIONS FORUM IN POLAND

The International Communications Forum in Poland in December brought together 35 Polish journalists and 20 media people from other countries, including Albania, the Czech Republic and Lithuania. The invitation committee included the Association of Polish Journalists (SDP), the Polish Association of Newspaper Publishers and the Catholic Information Agency. The forum took place at the SDP's conference centre.

In a debate on 'Free society: free media: free journalists', the Editor-in-Chief of the daily Sztandar, Michale Komar, who is President of the Newspaper Editors' Association, expressed anxiety that constraints might be put on the media, now that the Presidency, the Premiership and Parliament are all in former communist hands. This was discounted by the President of the SDP, Andrzej Sawicki, who considered that private ownership was here to stay and the situation was far removed from the days when editors were State lackeys. Dr Jara Moserová, playwight and President of UNESCO in the Czech Republic, said, however, that journalists always need personal courage to stand for truth, a view strongly supported by Michael Finley, Governor of the International Press Foundation.

The conference studied a new media charter written by a committee of journalists headed by the Primate of Poland's chaplain to the intellectual community, and already agreed by the national councils of 14 media associations. Participants also saw the video For the Love of Tomorrow in Polish.

In wide-ranging discussions, new relationships were built. A Polish war correspondent to Bosnia said, 'I take hope from friendships I have formed here with journalists from other countries.'

The event was largely funded by the Government Press Office and the participants were welcomed at a reception in the Palace of the Council of Ministers. Participants were invited to future Forum events: Budapest, 29 March to April 1; Caux, 23-28 July; and Sydney, 25-29 October.

Overall it was both an extremely enjoyable and challenging time for the 33 young people involved (and also for the not-so young!).

CAUX 50TH COUNCIL MEETING

In early January 32 of us met in Caux. We took time to re-think why we have invested so much time and thought in this Jubilee. One simple answer is because we feel called, have felt led, know our need of fresh life, renewal and sense a stirring of God's spirit in us and our work. Many of us have had encouraging glimpses of what others outside our ranks hope for and expect from this anniversary. The highlights of our discussions and the major needs which emerged are listed below.

Highlights:

- The 7½-minute Caux promotional video is now available in English and will be sent out from London. Ken Dodds is now working on the French and German versions.
- A final version of the Caux Anniversary Committee list is being produced and sent out.
- Camilla and Axel Nelson, François and Anja Orphelin and Ian Kiaer have met in Oslo on the Exhibition. Visits to local suppliers of Caux have started, with a view to finding Exhibition sponsors, with encouraging results.
- The Changer team are finalising the Press kit and it is being translated into English and German. It can be adapted for use in different countries. We are exploring the possibility of putting the

- material (in three languages) with photographs, on MRA's World Wide Web page on the Internet.
- The colour pictorial is in final production. We should have copies early in March. This might also go on to the WWW page.
- There have been encouraging responses to the idea of different geographical areas carrying the three periods of the summer. We strongly recommend that these three areas/groups regularly exchange information and ideas we saw excellent American and Australian letters, but has each regional group seen the other's ideas? There will be a European planning meeting in Haguenau, France, February 8-13, to plan the first period, the two events in it, and for East and Central European participation throughout the summer in Caux.
- Student volunteers will again come from Britain to help carry the service work, covering each three-week segment with a short overlap.
- Rosemary Mattingley has offered to serve as conference office manager for the summer.
- A list of the events of the summer, and personalities who have accepted or seem likely to come, is available for private use on visits.

Major needs:

- Translation throughout the summer, and especially during certain peak events. Final year students of simultaneous interpretation are needed, preferably volunteers, otherwise paid professionals. Andrew Stallybrass needs to be replaced as coordinator of the English translation so that he can take on the media fully. A 'manager' without language skills could organise this, but will still need translators! The French and German translation also needs student volunteers.
- The next (and final!) meeting of the 50th Council will be in Paris, starting 14.30, Saturday April 20, and leaving after lunch on Wednesday 24. Each work sector, three-week period and event should be represented at this meeting. Please announce yourselves to the Tates or Lasserres in Paris.
- There are still needs in the Kitchen and the Economat despite some positive replies to the cooks' letter. Perhaps a few paid cooks will need to be engaged for certain peak days.
- On the Front Desk/Reception more people with some skill in English and French.
- Each three-week period group needs to plan for the inclusion of young people (and for the 'animation' of the Caux café).
- The Reference team needs a higher profile.
 Should they meet at a regular time and place?
 We will discuss this further in Paris.
- New staff for the Bookshop and the Exhibition.

- Security in the house needs to be addressed afresh. There will be quite a few VIPs coming.
- The Press team will be especially important this summer. French and German language skills most needed.

MRA'S NAME

I believe that MRA has been created not just for the twentieth century but perhaps even more for the twenty-first; and that we need now to be shaping it for its role in the coming century. That involves many issues. A crucial one is the name. Many of us find the name Moral Re-Armament inappropriate.

Two years ago the Cyprus consultation report gave cogent reasons for a change of name, and concluded, 'This search will be carried on through widespread discussion and reflection, and we expect that it will be clear to us all when the right phrase has emerged.'

Since then, though work has been put in, no phrase has emerged which sparks much enthusiasm. We may need a more determined search. May I offer, therefore, to host a discussion on the matter? Everyone is welcome to send me their ideas. If they want to be part of the ongoing discussion I will ensure that the material I receive is distributed regularly to them. My phone and fax are below. Where possible, I would like to communicate by e-mail (jbond@canberra.dialix.oz.au), as it is cheapest. Any who would like to be fellow-hosts of the discussion would be welcome, particularly those who speak other languages.

Our hope, of course, is to find a name that expresses the next great task for MRA, just as Moral Re-Armament was an attempt to express that in 1938. I believe we can find it, but it will take steady, hard work in discussion and consultation.
