#### WORKING TO CREATE PEACE IN RWANDA

Since we returned from Caux last August, we have been working relentlessly to help heal the wounds among our compatriots in order to build a better future. After visiting all the regions of the country, we decided to have a meeting of those of us involved in MRA work around the country, to share our experiences and to launch out together on a new path. We held a national conference in Kigali, 8-9 January, with the theme, 'Creating peace in Rwanda'. Peace, we believe, depends on our efforts; we cannot leave it to a third party.

Sixty people attended, two-thirds of them women. We talked about the Agenda for Reconciliation and saw the video For the Love of Tomorrow. We examined our consciences to see where we need to change our own behaviour, in our homes, in society and in the world. Everyone had the chance to share their ideas. We all agreed that moral principles offer a road towards healing, but something more is needed. As the testimonies about healing streamed in, we felt an explosion of joy.

At the end of the conference we decided to invite foreign friends to come to Rwanda and work with us, meeting the people whose lives have been destroyed by the genocide and the evils which followed the war.

#### STOCKHOLM HOPE IN THE CITIES SEMINAR

'To know and be known, to accept and be accepted – that is the prerequisite for all good police work.' Police Commissioner Hans Papeveld from Holland was speaking at a seminar on 'Ethnic minorities, the police and society' at the MRA-centre in Stockholm, 29-30 November. He continued: 'To build bridges and create contacts is a life style. If you do it with your heart it is a beautiful job.'

Twenty-four people took part in the seminar, which was planned jointly by Anders Eskeland from Oslo, Mohamed Mansuri from Copenhagen and Harry Ferngren from Stockholm as part of the Hope in the Cities program in Europe.

Police officers from Copenhagen, Newcastle and Utrecht also told of their experience in working with minority groups in their cities. It was clear that there is rethinking going on in police ranks. A Danish police officer, Bent Olsen, said that he and his colleagues had left some stereotypes behind, studied Arabic, worked at crime prevention and had reduced criminality among 15-18-year-old boys by

fifty percent in one central Copenhagen district. Meanwhile Hari Shukla from Newcastle told of his experience, as a representative of a minority group, of building co-operation with the police by establishing face-to-face meetings.

The participants came from eight countries. Hamit Gurguri from Kosovo, who recently visited his homeland, told of the difficult police situation there.

The social program included a walk through the historic Old Town and a visit to the Vasa Museum where a ship, built in 1628, is preserved. Sylvie Söderlund gave a concert with songs by Nordic composers. Another evening the Somali and Pakistani participants spoke about their countries.

By the end of the seminar we found that we had many common concerns and some ideas on how to promote participation of the minorities in the daily life of our societies.

#### A SPECIAL NEW YEAR'S EVE IN INDIA

We have been working with the poor children living in our area. We invited 35 children, aged five to fourteen, to take part in a program on the eve of the year 2000. Most of them come from homes where their parents dropped out of school, or have never set foot in a class room. Few of the children had performed before, and they couldn't understand the fuss about turning up to rehearsals! However, when we held a dress rehearsal on 30 December, excitement began to grow.

An empty plot adjoining our house was cleared and a pandal erected. Colourful lights and loudspeakers gave a festive feeling. The program started with a Sanskrit prayer and welcome song. Songs from different countries were presented. Then every child participated in a dance tableau, 'The Garden', written for the occasion, with a Tamil commentary and Monkey as the storyteller. It expressed the values of care, love and friendship. The children had given their ideas for the tableau. After it, the Director of the Bureau of Indian Standard, Chennai, distributed prizes.

The program culminated at midnight when the entire audience of 200, including the parents and relatives of the children, stood in a circle holding lighted candles to welcome the year 2000. We all sang a prayer for peace throughout the world. Against the back drop of the Indian Airlines hijack, and the happy ending of this dramatic saga, the prayer had special meaning.

#### CONTINUING THE CONSULTATION DIALOGUE

I once heard someone say: 'Some people have a calling to confrontation, others to reconciliation.' When meeting someone opposed to her campaign against animal vivisection, she realised that the most productive course was to say: 'Let us at least fight for better conditions for these animals.' This would often result in a surprised agreement from her opponent.

Hasn't change for most of us come through discovering a loving heavenly Father who enlarged our perspective rather than from some one telling us how wrong we were? Probably the greatest need is for us to care to such an extent, that the needs of our countries and the world burn in our hearts, so that we will be led to people and places where something can be done about them.
