Age".

Speaking of Britain, Mr. Vickers said: "She is fighting her way back to recovery and winning."

Mr. Vickers said the British worker had not lost his skill. All that he had lost for a time was true direction.

"Britain is now fighting back

and new nationhood". He declared that 25 years of moral re-armanent work lay behind the present increase in output in Britain, and was the best promise of a true recovery.
