

Way To End Bitterness

THE Mayor, Mr. Percy Osborn, told an audience of prominent Durban people last night that there could be a bright new world if people would only extend the hand of friendship to their neighbours. If people would practice the four principles of Moral Rearmament the bitterness in South Africa and the rest of the world would be forgotten.

He was speaking at the conclusion of a documentary film recording the fortunes of a Japanese delegation, from all walks of life, which attended the world conference on Moral Rearmament in Caux, Switzerland.

The film traced the travels of the 70 Japanese team—members of the Diet, trades unionists, a

chief of police and two mayors—from Caux to Germany, and thence to Britain before crossing the Atlantic to the United States.

Cr. W. Williams, who introduced the film, said that after returning home members of the delegation had addressed about 1,000,000 people urging the adoption of the Moral Rearmament principles. Some had also spoken in Korea.

At the conference, Mr. Williams said, the Japanese and other delegates found a great uniting ideal for their countries—democracy's alternative to the chaos and strife in the world.

The film was seen last night by members of Parliament, members of the Provincial Council, City Councillors and leaders of commerce and industry.
