A way out of the world crisis

The generation that had split the atom had to find a new way to help itself in the present world crisis, and that way was moral rearmament, Mr. Bremer Hofmeyr, South African leader of the Moral Rearmament movement, told a well-attended meeting in the Selborne Hall last night.

Mr. Hofmeyr said the present world crisis was one of a struggle of ideas. Nations were arming in an atomic age. What was needed was a great uniting idea, an idea which would be big enough for all.

Moral Rearmament gave every person a chance to "get into the fight" and build a world free from hate and fear.

It stood for changes and if it were to succeed these would have to be made. Love, security, and freedom were some of the ideologies of Moral Rearmament.

IN THE FAR EAST

Not until there was a new world with new ideas would there be an answer to Communism into which Moral Rearmament was already penetrating. In the Far East it was spreading and five of the seven Japanese signatories to the recent peace treaty were actively interested.

Mr. Acting Justice C. J. Claassen said that Natives were saying that without Moral Rearmament the future of the country looked far from favourable. The right ideology, Moral Rearmament, was needed to bring about agreement between the two races of Africa.
