He will also do well to visualise the effect on the future of southern Africa of a few hundred people, maybe a few thousand starting with himself with the courage and selfsacrifice to make a similar commitment.

Among the "case his-tories" of changed lives are those of David Smith, son of Prime Minister Ian Smith, and his newly-found soul - mate Arthur Kanodereka, treasurergeneral of the ANC wing); Muzorewa Naude, a north - eastern Transvaal farmer; Rolly Kingwill, a Karoo farmer Peter Gordon, a Coloured land owner; the Rev George Daneel, a former rugby Springbok; Prof W. D. Jonker, a theologian; and Pat Sohn, Coloured Representative Council whip.
