Another woman who spoke was Ouma C Hofmeyer, who together with Mr. and Mrs. P. Q. Vundla were reporting their impressions of the Moral Re-Armament conference in Japan. An old woman of 80 years, Mrs. Hofmeyer said she went to Japan against medical advice because of the challenge she felt.

The world was moving from crisis to crisis. She found that during the conference the 55 nations represented had their individual problems and difficulties. And said they could be overcome if the people could accept the challenge and be revolutionary enough and discard fear, selfishness and hate.

Troubled spots

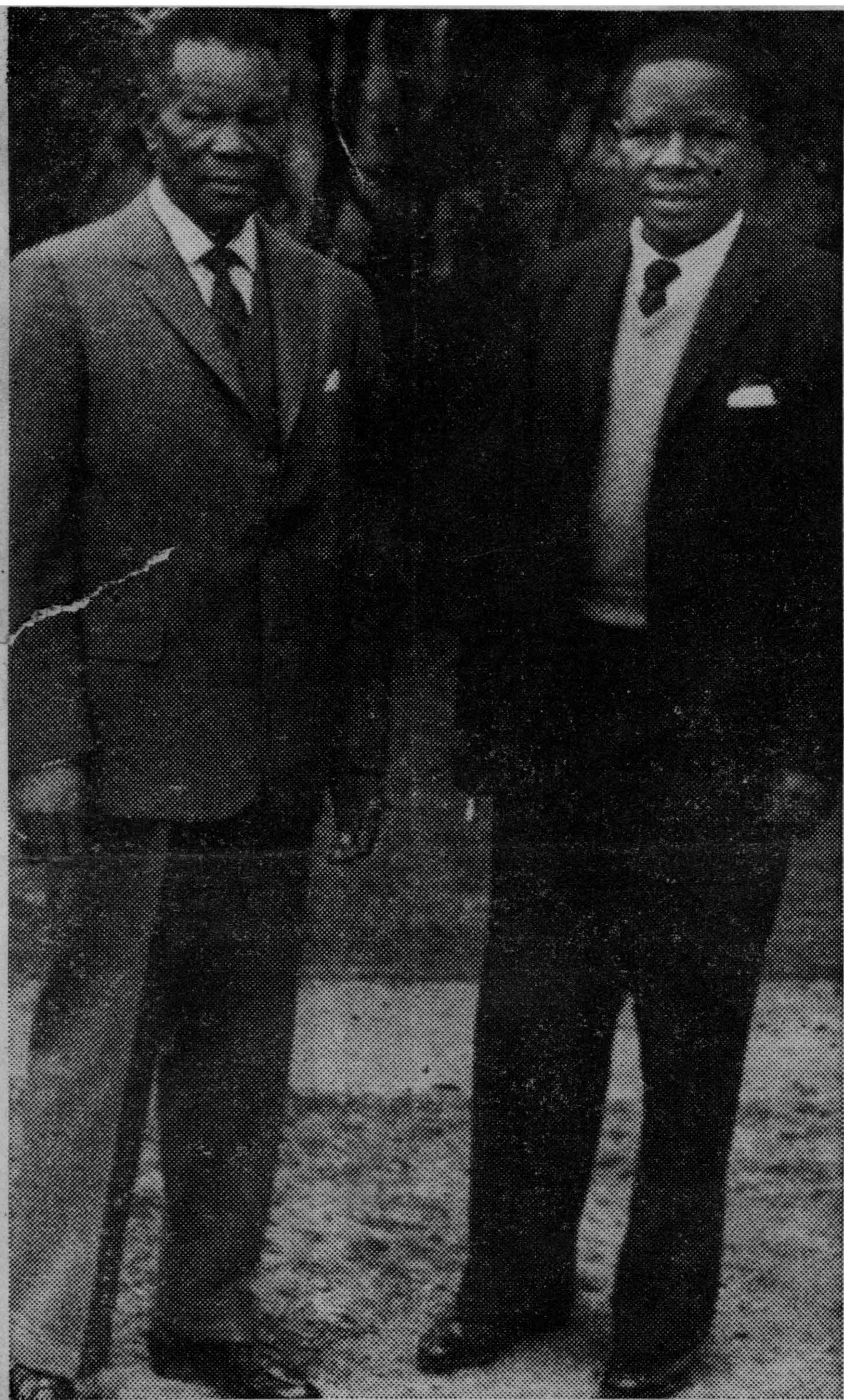
She said Germany was divided and a wall built to separate the city. She said that wall was first created in the hearts of people. It was a wall of hate and fear.

He said South Africans, Black or White, were inclined to think they had more problems than other nations. That was not the position.
