
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Musical with a difference

The musical is acted, organised, and stage-managed by scores of young South Africans. The cast include nurses, students, soldiers, teachers, police cadets and others. The show is fast moving with scores of rousing songs that have caught the imagination of yound and old.

The show, I am told, is an expression of the patriotism and faith the young people in the cast have in God. They sing and work without salary and with energy, talent and gaiety.

Springbok Stampede first hit the headlines two years ago. The cast then consisted of 20 young people. Today hundreds of young people, English- and Afrikaans - speaking, count themselves part of Springbok Stampede.

Last year Springbok Stampede visited America with outstanding results. Now it is on a tour of the Republic and Rhodesia.

The name, Springbok Stampede, was the brain-child of Charlotte Daneel, daughter of the Springbok rugby player, George Daneel.

Charlotte spent some time in America where she took part in a sing-out, the American name for a similar show. On her return to South Africa she felt that South African youth should take up the challenge like their American counterparts and put their feelings and aims across young people do everything themselves.
