A SERVICE is to be held in Salisbury today in honour of the Rev. Arthur Kanodereka, who was murdered last month.

Tribute will be paid to him for the remarkable work he was doing for peace in Rhodesia. Much of this work was behind the scenes, and so the public was mostly unaware of it, yet it must have been bearing fruit; otherwise the murder was completely without motive.

It is a tragedy that men of this calibre, and of the calibre of District Commissioner David Mirams, who concern themselves so deeply with the welfare of their fellow citizens, should not live to see the completion of their work.

Instead, others must take up the burden. And that is what Rhodesia needs so desperately today: Men who can assume leadership in what should become a great crusade for peace.

On New Year's Day we urged that this yearning for peace. shared by the great majority of people in Rhodesia, should be harnessed into something great and powerful. For this to happen we need leaders able to talk freely to all the factions involvedmen such as the Rev. Arthur Kanodereka, in fact.

Surely there must be some with both the courage and conviction to inherit the mantle?
