COCONUT THATCH TO CONCRETE

8,000 miles across India

By Arun Mundkur

Tonight you will see a production called *India Arise*. Indian men and women are finding Moral Re-Armament a workable way to end injustice and misery; a practical way of fighting the evils in men's hearts which warp and twist society; and *India Arise* is their voice, their mouthpiece.

This musical was conceived at a conference for Moral Re-Armament held in Bombay in May, 1966. From all over the country came teachers and professors, government employees, businessmen, students and labour leaders, to discuss India's future. We planned how Moral Re-Armament could be applied to our country's massive and urgent problems and how we could take to millions what we had learnt about unity and hard work, and the courage to stand up for our convictions.

So we wrote songs and sketches, prepared the folk dances of our different States, and created *India Arise*.

Many of us faced difficult alternatives. Would we pursue our clearly-outlined business or professional careers? Or would we work to generate a new spirit in our country with *India Arise?*

During the following months we travelled the length and breadth of India. Money was contributed towards the travelling expenses of a cast.

Foreign diplomats were fascinated. The representative of one Communist nation said, "I have seen no such spirit anywhere during my four years in India. You must give this to your people". He was the last man to leave the auditorium.

Bombay's students cheered, clapped and stamped and joined in the songs at the end. We in the cast were almost pushed off-stage when we invited them to join us in the battle to change India!

Then *India Arise* was requested in Kerala. We put on the show for 17,000 people one week, learning large sections of it in Malayalam to do so. In another stretch of ten days we put on the show seven times, each time in a different place. The stage crew worked night and day, setting up the four tons of equipment, doing the performance, packing the equipment into jeeps and trucks and transporting it

to the next place. At night the cast walked home through paddy-fields, to the coconut-thatched houses of our village hosts. In one open-air show at Kuttikanam village 5,000 saw *India Arise*, some coming miles on foot from neighbouring villages.

The Choice

Many patted us on our backs and praised our "devotion". A few in each town met truth face to face, choosing between quiescence and revolution.

After Kerala we went to Madras, the centre of South Indian civilisation. As in Bombay, leadership of every description came night after night, and a tidal wave of young people. Trainees of the OTU, from among whom the officer cadres of India's armed forces are drawn, came in hundreds. Then one of the biggest film studios in Madras offered us facilities to make a documentary about *India Arise*. Prem Prakash, whose documentaries on Jawaharlal Nehru and Lal Bahadur Shastri won Commonwealth

awards, flew down from Delhi. In 36 hours, working through one night till 4 am, we completed the film, A Challenge Met.

From Madras to Hyderabad, and thence to New Delhi. Cabinet Ministers came, performance after performance. One of them, a life-long revolutionary Socialist, bearing on his shoulders the immense burden of moving India's economy forward, told others after meeting members of the cast, "I have seen in them the continuation of the revolution. The spark has not gone out". Sardar Hukam Singh, Speaker of the Lok Sabha (Lower House), said to newsmen after a performance, "These youth have determination, purpose and a goal. If all the youth of our country could be the same, then India's future would be assured".

Of Long-term Importance

One official gave us Rs. 1,000 from his savings. The Vice-Chancellor of Delhi University pressed us to meet his students, and offered to help with the arrangements. He said, "What you have is of vital, long-term importance".

One Ambassador took members of the cast with him visiting other diplomats and selling them tickets! Many said, "You must visit our country".

The Maharani of Jaipur, MP, invited us to her city. One remarkable evening there, a leading Indian industrialist found himself onstage with the cast singing alongside members of a Czech dramatic group who were visiting India. The industrialist said, "I came on-stage to express that I am fully with you". The man in charge of the Czech delegation said, "This is the new type of theatre. You have got very clear ideas and clean thinking. Since coming to India we have seen much that has given us pain. Now we can go back full of hope having seen this force in action".

Calcutta is not just an Indian city but one of the centres of all Asia's life. The trade of India's heavily industrialised middle and northern provinces pours through this channel. Calcutta was an important starting-point of India's cultural and political

revolution in the first half of the twentieth century.

We were taken to meet the Harijans (Untouchables) of Calcutta. They said, "Nobody of any consequences has ever come to our homes". They asked for help in getting more pay from their employers. They took us into their unbelievably tiny, dirty huts Rajmohan Gandhi and those with him could offer no direct financial help, for though they yearned to help, their combined resources would not even ease life a little for a few days for a mere thousand of India's poor. But they told the Harijans about the revolution of MRA. They described how the power of God in their own hearts had changed them, though they had been callous, selfish or cynical. And how the inner voice daily shows them the way to give rich men, powerful men and ordinary men, too, the chance to change. And they said, "You, too, can change. And God will show you how to change the other millions of India, the poor and the rich. When we Indians learn to care for each other and begin to work every day for the country, then we will have the food we need".

Invitation to Europe

It was in Calcutta that news reached us of the generous invitation to take *India Arise* to Europe, extended to us by the Westminster Theatre.

The Mayor of Delhi, Mr. Nuruddin Ahmed, gave us messages addressed to the mayors of the cities we would visit during our journey.

The evening before our departure for the Middle East and Europe, Dr. Zakir Husain, then Vice-President of India, received us at his residence.

Coming as we do from every caste—Brahmin to Harijan—of many creeds—Hindu, Muslim, Buddhist, Sikh, Christian and Parsi—from far-flung quarters of the Indian Union—Nagaland to Kerala, village and city—we are conscious of representing our 470 million people. We hope your experience of *India Arise* will make some of the colour, movement and music of our sub-continent live for you.

But our purpose transcends culture. It is to propel men across the gulf from analysis to action, from by-standing to their full part in remaking the world.

MOMENT OF HISTORY

The *India Arise* men and women want to give Moral Re-Armament to the nations they visit. Their aim is not popular response or the creation of a new Indian image. It is to help other nations solve their problems. They want so to live and work that God might use them to give men they meet qualities of honesty, purity, unselfishness and love.

Their desire is to enable each country they go through to find and play its special role in rebuilding this broken world.

These men and women are far from being perfect. Like all of us, they have their ups and downs. But their strongest wish is to be of service and help to other nations and the Almighty will honour that.

This is the first time that a group of Indians of this size is moving unitedly across continents with the dominant purpose of giving. Their action marks a moment of history.

The *India Arise* men and women will, I believe, be used to change people where they go, bridge divisions and heal hates. This will happen because they are honest about their natures and have decided to use their lives for other people.

They will be happy to give their show when asked, or work without it if that is felt right. They will be content to give their best in whatever work or opportunity comes to them.

Problems at home are no barrier to giving answers abroad. Exporting men and women who have some knowledge of how to deal with human nature can become India's normal way of life. And the challenge of the world's needs can muster in India the incentive to tackle her own.

As a show, *India Arise* has been a remarkable triumph inside India for the last nine months—in Bombay, Maharashtra, Kerala, Madras, Andhra, Bengal, Rajasthan, Delhi and Punjab. I believe that it will win audiences everywhere to a new appreciation of India and what she stands for. But a new world, a world where man no longer cheats, hates, worships or exploits his fellow men, is the target of *India Arise's* men and women, and a new Indian image will be the fruit of their battle, not its aim.


What India can do in and for the Middle East, Europe, Africa, the Americas and the rest of Asia ought to be the rightful concern of the man in the street, the student, the peasant, the worker, as well as of the officials of India's External Affairs Ministry.

An extraordinary range of backgrounds is represented in the *India Arise* force. There are Brahmins and Harijans, rich and poor, old and young, villagers and town folk.



She has taken part in several productions of Moral Re-Armament including Through the Garden Wall and Monsoon Magic.




MUSICAL DIRECTOR


STAGE MANAGER





WORK FOOD AND A SATISFYING PURPOSE

Permanent training centre

As we in *India Arise* left India, work began on the first buildings of a permanent Training Centre for Moral Re-Armament at Panchgani, 160 miles from Bombay on the Western Ghats.

Ringed by the majestic cliffs of the Panchgani tableland, 4,300 feet above sea level and overlooking the valley of the Krishna River, this Centre will train thousands of men and women, young and old, in the skills needed to provide work, food and a satisfying purpose for millions in Asia.

It will train men in the secret of how to galvanise the apathetic and provide a healing, uniting alternative for the struggle-weary millions of China.

Youth will find a dedication and seflessness which will equip them to lead Asia and the world of the future.

Peasants will find a concern for the food needs of their whole nation as well as a passion to overcome all obstacles.

Labour and management from the industrial cities will forge together a new motive for industry where each has a full part in serving the nation's needs.

Politicians will decide to live for their nation and the next generation.

The Training Centre will eventually have facilities

to accommodate and feed 650 people, with meeting hall, auditorium for plays and productions, open-air theatre, playing fields, indeed all the facilities needed to train people to be mentally alert, physically fit and morally straight.

Food production will provide practical training in how to make maximum use of resources. The first rice, wheat and vegetable crops have already been harvested.

Leaders in India's neighbouring countries have already expressed the hope that the best of their young men and women could be trained for leadership at Panchgani and indeed here India will be the host to people from many parts of the world.

People from other countries of the world as well as Indians are already helping on the construction, finance and agricultural programme. An Australian architectural firm and a Bombay consulting engineer are planning and supervising the construction free of charge.

The first buildings to go up are a guest house and a residence block to house and feed 150 people complete with meeting and dining rooms. They are due for completion in October and will cost Rs.700,000 (£35,000) and for this the sum of at least Rs.60,000 (£3,000) has to be paid every month.

People of many backgrounds and nationalities are taking part in financing it. Industrial firms are making contributions; two widows have given funds to build two bedrooms (a bedroom costs Rs.6,000 or £300); a school teacher gives a monthly contribution; a sales executive also gives monthly from his salary; students have been raising money from friends and relations. Canadians are giving generously in memory of a compatriot who died working for MRA in India; an Australian lady sold a valued family heirloom, a pendant of gold and diamonds, and gave the proceeds.



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
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
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
