

# PLEA FOR A HATE-FREE, GREED-FREE, FEAR-FREE RHODESIA FROM M.R.A.

## SALISBURY.

25 MEN and women from 15 countries are in Rhodesia this week. They are a force of Moral Re-Armament which has been invited to this country by people of all races.

Most of them are under 25 years old. They come from all

over Europe from North of the Arctic Circle to Portugal — and from Japan, the U.S.A. and Morocco. Black and white have joined them from South Africa and Swaziland.

Mr Gosta Ekman, a former Editor of the Swedish daily "Svenska Dagbladet" will move with the force, as will Conrad Hunte, former Vice-Captain of the West Indies Cricket Team, who is already in Rhodesia.

They start their visit with a showing of their musical presentation, "Time to Choose" at the Courtauld Theatre on April 29th.

## WIDE-RANGING

For the next six weeks they have a wide-ranging programme in many parts of Rhodesia.

Professor Craig, the Principal of the University of Rhodesia, will give a reception for them at the university.

Black and white students have invited them to hold meetings on the campus.

A Mabvuku headmaster is arranging for them to meet with residents of Mabvuku.

Families in Alexandra Park are inviting friends to meet them in their homes.

Indians in Bulawayo are arranging a one-day conference where they will meet with

the youth of Bulawayo.

The General Manager of the Selukwe Chrome Mines has asked them to Selukwe.

Everywhere the force will stay in private homes. This is one way in which people are helping in this venture. Others are helping with food, with transport and with money.

The force raised the whole of their return fares to Rhodesia from Europe — \$15,000 — before they set out. They sold possessions and emptied savings accounts. Over 500 people from across Europe also contributed to this sum.

They come because they believe that this nation has a vital role to play in answering the problem of division which

almost every country faces one form or another.

They believe that here can be worked out the unself society which neither East or West has so far created. Their aim is to enlist everyone in battle to create a fear-free, greed-free, hate-free world. They have all taken this on their own countries.

Rhodesians of a wide variety of backgrounds and political persuasions who are at work in this task will speak in a meeting at the Harry Margo Hall on 10th May.

Its theme will be "South Africa — What kind of change?" The visiting MR force will also participate in this meeting.
