WOOL CHEQUE WILL GO TO MORAL RE-ARMAMENT

Soft spoken Roland Kingwill has told Moral Re-Armament that a cheque representing accumulated war-time wool profits and wool levy is theirs when it arrives.

It is for propaganda work for M.R.A in the Eastern Province, he said.

On his farm Gordonville, lying on the boundary of Graaff-Reinet and Middelburg (Cape), Mr. Kingwill has applied the principles of Moral Re-Armament to his farm, his home life and the manner in which he handles his labourers.

Mr. Kingwill says he looks upon his farm as a trust and not as a way to get rich quickly. The nation's needs come before profit, he maintains.

Through combating soul erosion, Mr. Kingwill said he had also been able to combat soil erosion.

"The workers too," he maintains, "must be cared for as human beings."

On his farm he has improved the houses, wages and living conditions of his labourers and has never had any shortage of hands. For the children of his employees he has built a one-roomed school at which an African teacher paid by him teaches.

As a result of these changes, Mrs. Kingwill and the rest of the family are not afraid to remain on the farm alone if Mr. Kingwill has to go away, he says.

Their labourers and their families are right behind them.
