Two of the group, pert Hamish Scott and bubbling Mollie Minnie carry the brunt of the songs. Hamish is a fine performer with an amazing voice range. He reminded me of the British folk singer Donovan. He excels with "Something Should Be Happening," "Children Know" and a swinging, "Up With The People." Mollie, although a wee bit hesitant wins through with the sheer pleasure of her numbers.
